  - Approved, with abstentions, the target for college readiness
    - DSC was asked by Board to consider whether another indicator might be more appropriate
    - Board also asked what percent of E<sup>3</sup>'s 5-county target area is comprised of students from the 9 ISDs that were identified by CAN as being most relevant to people living and working in Travis County. Answer is: the 9 ISDs equal 73% of the total MSA student population, and AISD alone comprises 28% of the total MSA student population (see attached).
  - Approved Executive Committee's recommendation that the target for proportionality of Jail Bookings be "proportionality by 2017"
    - Note slight change in data, due to technical correction
